La Befana

The Feast of the Epiphany, celebrated January 6 with a national holiday in Italy, and the tradition of La Befana are a big part of Italian Christmas celebrations. Epiphany commemorates the 12th day of Christmas when the three Wise Men arrived at the manger bearing gifts for Baby Jesus. The traditional

Italy's traditional celebration includes the tale of a witch known as La Befana who arrives on her broomstick during the night of January 5 and fills the stockings with toys and sweets for the good children and lumps of coal for the bad ones.

According to the legend, the night before the Wise Men arrived at the manger they stopped at the shack of an old woman to ask directions. They invited her to come along but she replied that she was too busy. Then a shepherd asked her to join him but again she refused. Later that night, she saw a great light in the sky and decided to join the Wise Men and the shepherd bearing gifts that had belonged to her child who had died. She got lost and never found the manger.

Now La Befana flies around on her broomstick each year on the 11th night, bringing gifts to children in hopes that she might find the Baby Jesus. Children hang their stockings on the evening of January 5 awaiting the visit of La Befana.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

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Quiet Places

Every traveler arrives at a point when the crowds, noise and traffic require pause and hope for a quite place to do so. From time to time I hope to write about quiet places from our travels to Italy, which will allow for an escape or stay, not too far from the major tourist locations.

Chiesa (Church) of St. Clemente, Rome. There is reference as far back as 392 A.D. to a small church preserving the memory of St. Clement, who lived in the time of Emperor Trajan (98-117 AD). Parts of the location had other uses and the first time it was reconstructed was in the first century following the great fire of 64. The first uses as a religious center were as a cult sanctuary for Mithras about 200 AD. It was also a private home where Christians engaged in obscured worship for self protection.

With the construction of the Coliseum as a tourist attraction, the crowds showed up over time and yes, they are still there along with modern noise and traffic of the city. At more than one time, Chiesa of St. Clemente needed to grow. Rather than come up with a plan for an expansion on the existing building, parts of the structure were imploded and the surrounding area filled in with earth to form a slightly larger plateau accommodating subsequent structures and renovations. In the fourth century, another implosion and fill took place to make way for the foundations of the current church honoring Pop Clement. That fourth century basilica was filled in with rubble to the top of its pillars and the new basilica was built.

The church's proximity to the Coliseum lends for plenty of amateur interests and speculation, as original floors of both structures are of the same stone makeup and at about same depth. The relics of St. Clement are beneath the basilica's alter and are taken out for a procession through the neighborhood on the November 23 each year – the feast of St. Clement.

Starting in the 1850's, excavations were begun under the present basilica. The work uncovered the original fourth century church, but also allowed access to the lower level church from the first century. Access through this slice of history was improved when stairs were installed; creating safe passage though the layers of the church's history.

For the traveler that grows tired of the bustle of today's Coliseum, Chiesa De St. Clemente is a must see! It is a leisurely stroll from the SE end of Piazza del Colosseo. If the weather is nice, take care to cross the main street running along the North of the Colosseo (via Del Fori Imperiali) into the park then, walk along the Parco Del Colle Oppio to the SE. Once you are inside the Church, you are greeted by friendly staff and volunteers with easy to read, visually informative booklets in several languages. Fees are nominal compared to many things on your trip.

Within this comfortable access, remaining walls and floors of previous churches are exposed to show the wonderful art and architecture of their time including; mosaics, frescos and stonework. The current basilica has amazing works of art commissioned by patrons over its life that are to be admired.

The garden area is perfect for a peaceful moment and planning your next destination. The neighborhood is inviting with plenty of cafes. This is a special place and we hope that it remains in its current state for a long time to be appreciated.
