Pax Romana, Yale University Press

Almost anyone could be a Roman – like it or not.

The idea that Pax Romana – peace among Romans – even existed was a play on words. The Roman Empire that is the basis for many of our societies and governments today – was held together by fear and force and layers to protect its interests. Certainly, we are aware in business of strategic alliances – two or more parties have what the other needs. But in the case of the Romans what they had taken or acquired - including slaves – became the basis of the economy. What others needed was only for Rome to control. The Empire expanded to reach from modern day Scotland to the Persian Gulf as far as Syria.

In Pax Romana we see an excellent presentation about the day to day business affairs of living in the Roman Empire. Not a page goes by where the reader might realize they could be taking in accounts of today's news and business events. Even in modern times, it is more profitable to be at war than at peace. One could claim great wealth to have expanded the Empire. The price was 5000 souls dead, or alive as slaves; an audited amount for Rome to reward the good deed of expansion. During Julius Caesar's rule one million people met their death and another million are said to have been enslaved.

Just how profitable was it was to be at war than at peace and to what length was worth the risk of fraud? A company supplying shipping services to the Empire filed a claim that it had lost two of a number of ships laden in route that were carrying cargo insured by the Empire. This being a time of peace, there was time for an investigation, which turned up that the two claimed lost cargo vessels were nothing more than garbage barges.

If you served in the army for 25 years you were rewarded quite often with a plot of land to use or rent out and to own along with slaves if you were in successful campaigns. Persons living in the provinces however, were subject to arbitrary abuse of power or use where it suited the magistrate and as long as the Empire got a portion. A group of Jewish folks decided to construct a new place of worship allowed by what we know as zoning laws. The neighboring property owners did not like this idea and filed for construction of mixed use. Their intent was made clear with gratuities to the magistrate that they wanted to make passage to the synagogue uncomfortable. This meant constructing tanneries, metal smelters, butchers, etc. Discovering this rouse, the Jewish folks also went to the magistrate with gratuities to influence decisions to their favor. The magistrate pocketed the money from both parties and with the end of his one year assignment being near the end, left for another part of the empire promptly on schedule. Neither party wanted to complain as it would meant admitting bribery of a public official.

Rome had its ways of making examples of not living up to expectations. Tacfarinas, a member of a wealthy construction family of North Africa joined the Roman army. Likely that he was not rewarded for his service as he felt appropriate, he left on his own to create a small pirate force that looted and pillaged Roman enclaves in his own homeland. The Romans engaged a dead or alive search. His reputation created such fear to encounter him, that a cohort of Romans (usually 480 men, ten cohorts is a legion) on his attack broke formation, and ran. The penalty by Rome was a lottery. The cohort was required to beat 10% of their own to death. The remaining had their food rations reduced and changed to barley – the food of farm animals.

Rome had its ways of dealing with parties that crossed them in business with the results being disastrous when the Empire got in the last word. Although the (Pax Romana continues on page 5)

Romans were beaten in many battles, they learned to adapt to a target and return again and again to reach victory. Such is the case of the emperor Trajan and the Dacians. They were a regional trading partner about 500 miles NE of Rome in the area of modern day Hungary. The Dacians were attacking Roman enclaves along their common border the Danube River. Trajan made one military push to bring them into compliance. The day he crossed the Rhine returning to Rome there was word of their renewed attack on Roman interests. Trajan returned two years later in 105 A.D. and slaughtered or enslaved the entire society estimated at 1.2 million people. 500,000 were turned into slaves with 10,000 taken back to Rome as gladiators for a 123 day festival. The story still exists 1900 years later as Trajan's column in Rome - as carved relief 126' tall, propaganda to save wall space.

The Roman Empire was about exploiting resources and money which required layers and layers of government. When there was no more to take and no more to give, the fabric of the Empire fell apart.

The scholarships for the 2017-2018 school year will be awarded to students who are selected based on meeting or exceeding the scholarship criteria (noted below). As in years' past; the better the GPA, the better chance of scholarship award.

Next steps in the scholarship process:

- May 2017 Application submission window closes May 10th, application verification begins
- June 2017 Award Recipients determined, all applicants notified of their status
- September 2017 Award Recipients published in the *il Ficcanaso* and presented at the General Meeting
- October 2017 Scholarship payments made to the schools on behalf of the recipients

The qualifications each recipient needs to meet or exceed are:

- 1. A parent of the applicant (student) must be in good standing in the Italian Club for at least three years. (Grand-parents are not included).
- 2. The parent(s) of the applicant must attend at least three club meetings during the year.
- 3. The applicant (student) is or will be enrolled in high school (grades 9 through 12) for the 2017-2018 school year, in the greater Seattle area.
- 4. The applicant (student) must have a grade point average of 3.0 or higher (with official transcript) and take part in extra-curricular activities, community service, etc.
- 5. Each applicant must write a letter telling about themselves and activities in which he/she is participating.
- 6. The application and transcript must be <u>post marked</u> no earlier than April 15th 2017 and no later than May 10th 2017.
- 7. Applications that are late, incomplete, or missing a transcript will not be considered.
